Guides Marie Huston and Tim Byas with sit-skier Andrea Goddard, with others in pursuit, on the sunny trails of Snow Mountain Ranch. nonprofit organization founded in 1975, modeled on a similar program in Beitostølen, Norway. We have year-round offshoots across the country, but our primary endeavor is a week-long international event each winter in which blind and mobility-impaired adults are taught the basics of cross-country skiing. They leave Ski for Light with a sense of accomplishment and motivation that often carries over to their everyday lives.

- As many as **300 people** attend each event, coming from all over the United States and from several foreign countries. Many wish to become more physically active and fit, and to find recreational opportunities that are lacking at home.
- Each visually impaired participant ("VIP") is paired for the week with an experienced, sighted cross-country skier who acts as ski instructor and guide. The disabled person skis in tracks or grooves groomed into the snow, while the guide skis in a parallel set of tracks. The guide

provides directions and skiing tips, gives encouragement, and describes the countryside. For our mobility-impaired participants ("MIPs"), who propel themselves in sit-skis, the guide might give a boost on hills and turns.

- The **volunteer guides** pay the same event fees as disabled skiers. Their motivation is simple: to share a favorite activity with someone who would otherwise not have the opportunity to participate. Most of these guides discover that in the process of giving of themselves, they are getting more in return. Many come back year after year.
- The **event location** changes in an effort to spread the Ski for Light concept to as many parts of the country as possible. In recent years we have gathered in Casper, Wyoming; Tahoe Donner, near Truckee, California; Bellaire, Michigan; Granby, Colorado (our 2023 location); and Rhinelander, Wisconsin (2024). Our 50th Anniversary International Event will be in Provo, Utah, with skiing at Soldier Hollow, Jan. 26-Feb.2, 2025.

Also in 2023, Ski for Light became the presenting sponsor of the American Birkebeiner Ski Foundation's ParaBirkie, in Hayward, Wisconsin, pictured at left. We stumbled through the goofy Giant Ski event, hosted a Birkie Expo booth, and volunteered at the famed "OO" aid station during the big race. Thanks largely to Michael Evelo's efforts, this partnership already has won us many friends, helped us recruit a number of excellent guides for our Rhinelander event, and gave some veteran SFLers a new stage on which to show their spirit: "Here I was, grossly out of shape, overweight and weaker than I had ever been," recalled sit-skier Jeff Pagels (center), one of several SFLers who participated in the ParaBirkie adaptive race. "But like many of you, I follow Charlie Wirth's exploits. I quickly came to the conclusion, 'If he can do it at age 102, I can do it at 74.'

ourteen of our skiers and guides traveled to Norway in March 2023 to participate in that wonderful ski week in Beitostølen, Ridderweek, which culminates in the actual Ridderrenn, a 20-kilometer race. The team of four that was selected to attend the 2020 event was finally able to make it, after the pandemic disruption, and then two more representatives were added, so the team members were VIPs Nancy Stevens, Michael McCulloch, and Charlie Wirth; and guides Kent Moore, Carl Lantz, and Astrid Mullen. The rest of the group were VIPs Marian Wildgruber, Kevin Whitley, and Sheri Richardson, and guides Anne Dal Vera, Ingrid Stammer, Patrick McManus, Peggy Malloy, and yours truly.

We were greeted by snow in Oslo, somewhat unusual for the time of year, but the reports of plentiful powder in Beitostolen were true. The tracks were deep and firm, which made for wonderful

skiing. Most days were sunny until race day, which was snowy and windy, but the racers were undaunted and reported a good race. Nancy won gold in Wednesday's biathlon and the Ridderrenn.

"Being in Norway with the SFL group was a unique opportunity to meet inspirational people," Ingrid recalled. "Through their joy of cross-country skiing, they taught life lessons in kindness, endurance and service."

Charlie celebrated his 102nd birthday by skiing 5 kilometers, and was serenaded by the audience and King's Guard singing Happy Birthday to him during the afternoon awards ceremony on Thursday. Charlie and his guide from last year and part of this year, Elena Erlendsdottir, were featured Monday after Ridderweek on television in Norway's version of *Good Morning America*.

IN MEMORY OF...

Ski for Light was saddened in 2023 by the passing of several Ski for Light veterans, along with our dear friend, singer-songwriter Jim Salestrom.

SFL pioneer Oral Miller (right) passed away on August 6, 2023, at the age of 90. He was one of the forty-two blind people from the U.S. who attended the very first SFL event in 1975. He recognized the potential that the fledgling organization had to improve the lives of blind people, and along with fellow pioneer Bud Keith worked to create an organization in which blind people could play a significant role. Oral was a member of the original SFL Board and served as Vice President for a period of time. He last attended in 1986.

Oral was a graduate of Princeton the University and University Chicago Law School. He was a longtime employee of the United States Small Business Administration. He was active and influential in many blindness organizations, in addition to SFL. Most notably, he served as president of the American Council of the Blind, and later as its Executive Director, and president of the United States Association of Blind Athletes. Thank you, Oral, for all that you did to improve the lives of your fellow blind people. Your legacy will live on forever.

Longtime guide Jerry Cox, who served at twenty events, died August 2, 2023 after a lengthy illness. Jerry and his wife, Lynn, were members of the 2014 Ridderrenn team, and are pictured here with Charlie Wirth and Gunvor Satra.

John Weimer, a guide and worker-bee at eighteen events, the last in 2008, passed away in June, 2023.
